From our Principal

Dear Families and Friends,

Gosh we have had another busy week at MPS. With restrictions easing it is nice to be able to welcome the community back into the school more regularly. Our playground spaces are now open to families before and after school for your children to use with your supervision. I know many students have missed that play opportunity. The school bubblers have reopened – just in time for the warmer weather. It's still a good idea for everyone to have their own drink bottle which can be refilled so they have ready access to water.

We have finalised the classes for 2021 and lists will be available to look at from Monday 30 November in the front office area of the school. All k-6 students will participate in a class meeting with their new teacher on Thursday 26 November where they will choose their class name for 2021. Thinking about 2021, stationery pack lists were sent home on Monday. We work really hard to keep these as reasonably priced as possible to enable every student to have what they need for learning.

We are implementing some small timetable changes for next year having two even play breaks over the day, 11:00-11:30 and 1:00-1:30. Students have 10 minutes before each of these break times to eat, so they are completely play focused during their outdoor time. We are introducing whole school multi-age enrichment next year, where students will choose what they are interested in investigating and experiencing over a 10 week period. This gives time to delve deeply into a topic, experience, or skill. If you have expertise or an interest in something that might be able to be shared with students and have a regular time on a Thursday afternoon next year, we would love to hear from you. Some of the areas which we are going to be able to provide experiences in are cooking, coding, gardening, painting, card making and dance.

We have been able to get the Check In Canberra App – so from now on when you visit for assemblies and the like you can check in via the app if you have downloaded it to your smart phone. The information is sent straight to ACT Health, we don't hold any of your information from the app. We will still have a manual sign on sheet if you prefer.

News just in, Ross Dennis has been successful in winning a position at Evelyn Scott school for next year. So after his involvement since 2008 at Macquarie as both a coach and teacher we will be farewelling him at the end of the year. I am sure you join me in wishing him well at his new position.

This coming Saturday morning we are having the last working bee of the year. It will be largely focussed in the preschool environment and we are hoping to get the cubby painted inside and out and a fair bit of garden clearing done. If you have a spare hour or two it would be great to see you there.





It was a happy village, full of seafood-loving villagers and fish as silky and tender as any other. Minamata was peaceful, that was at least until they met Chisso corp. Chisso was a chemical factory, initially producing fertiliser. They used a substance called Methylmercury (mercury) in their workings, and some of this mercury was found unsupervised smack-bang in the middle of Minamata's clean water, why? That was a question to ask Chisso. The mercury poisoned and infected the waters of Minamata, unfortunately affecting the fish and sealife too. The stray animals of the town ate and drank out of the contaminated water and caught a sickness in which we call today "the Minamata disease". It was a climate disaster, dogs started foaming in the mouth, seagulls and local birds fell stone-dead out of the sky, some say the cats started walking backwards! Foolishly, the villagers paid no attention to the new and unusual habits of the animals and the housewives set out to catch fish for them, and their husbands and kids supper like any other day. Whenever I come to this bit I cannot help but notice a sting heading to my heart and a tear drooling from my eye. Oh well, I bet you've already guessed what happened to Minamata's poor villagers (and don't forget the animals!). 900 people died and 2,265 people were certified as having directly suffered from mercury poisoning, the symptoms include very high fever, convulsions, psychosis, loss of consciousness, coma, and well, death! Chisso was fined much for their damage, US \$86 million to be exact, and was not caught dumping waste in Minamata bay ever again.

- Reduce your plastic waste, that'll decrease the amount of landfill
